God Made the Sky and Earth: Genesis 1:1-19



Children are like sponges. They absorb every word that we say and then take it to heart. We

need to be sources of encouragement and hope for them, or they will find inappropriate ways to gain attention and approval.

When God created the world, He looked at the things He had made. Over and over in Genesis 1, the Bible says, "God saw that it was good."

Look at the things your child makes this week. Take time to praise your child's work. Tell her that the work she has done is good, just as God's work was good. In doing so, you will be motivating your child and sending her a message of love and approval.



### Genesis 1:1, 31

Find these verses in a family Bible. Clap a rhythm as you say the verses with your child.

This week, help your child remember:

God made the sky and the earth.



Mystery Plants. Children enjoy playing guessing games. Have your child close his eyes and open his mouth. Put a small bite of food (a section of orange or a slice of carrot) in his mouth. Have your child taste the food. Ask, "What plant is this that God made for us?"

Provide clues as needed.

God Made Fish and Birds: Genesis 1:20-23



Always be aware of the great treasure and potential of your child. Be concerned about

all areas of your child's nurture and growth, but above all, strive to help your child grow spiritually.

Look at yourself first. Much of what a child learns is caught rather than taught. The reflection of your faith in God will form the lasting image and concept your child will have about God.

Remember that what a child sees and experiences has great significance. Since children develop deeply-held beliefs from attitudes and feelings during the early years, be ready to relate all things of life to God. For example, "Thank You, God, for fish in the neighbor's pond" is a teachable moment that has great spiritual significance to a child.



### Genesis 1:1, 31

Find these verses in a family Bible. Roll a ball back and forth with your child, repeating the Bible verses as the ball goes from one set of hands to the other.

This week, help your child remember:

God made fish and birds.



Finding Fish. Venture to a pet store with your child. Walk through the area of displayed fish. Talk about the different colors, sizes, and fins of the fish. Help your child count how many fish are in a tank, and point out the various species of fish. On the way home, thank God for all the special fish that He created. Note: This same activity can be done using a book about fish.

God Made Animals: Genesis 1:24, 25



Children have a natural curiosity about the world around them. Sharp

young eyes, questioning minds, and very busy hands automatically explore things from nature. What child can resist bounding after a tiny toad, touching the petals of a sunflower, or collecting lightning bugs on a summer night?

Take advantage of informal opportunities to talk about God the creator when children explore their world. Reinforce the truths of God's presence, goodness, and power. You can significantly impact your child's appreciation of nature and understanding of our wonderful creator during the early years. Take time to "stop and smell the roses" with your child.



### Genesis 1:1, 31

Find these verses in a family Bible. Pick a street and name it Bible Verse Lane. Every time you and your child travel down that street, say the Bible verses.

This week, help your child remember:

God made all the animals.



Animal Place Mats. Using old magazines, have your child cut out pictures of animals that God has made. Next, glue the pictures onto sheets of construction paper. Help your child cover the sheets with clear adhesive covering. Make a place mat for every member of your family. During mealtime, have family members talk about the different animals on their place mats.

Thank God for all the animals.

God Made People: Genesis 1:26-2:2



Give your child the wonderful gift of God's global view of the world. God

loves all people of the world, not just those who look like us or act as we do. The Bible says we are made in an amazing and wonderful way (Psalm 139:14).

Provide opportunities to explore other cultures. Children can begin to appreciate playing side by side with children who may speak a different language or have a different color of skin. Invite a family from another culture to come for a meal. Correspond with a missionary family. Read books and listen to music from other cultures. Help your child see people of the world as God sees them—all His children (John 1:12).



### Genesis 1:1, 31

Find these verses in a family Bible. Use an inflatable globe to toss back and forth with your child. Each time the globe is caught, say the Bible verses.

This week, help your child remember:

God made people.



God Created Me. Children love to see pictures of themselves at younger stages of their lives. Pull out a favorite picture of your child at a younger age. Talk about the picture and why it is one of your favorite captured moments. Share with your child unique traits God has created in the child. Talk about how your child has grown and what has been learned since the picture was taken. Thank God together for making people.



Noah Builds a Boat: Genesis 6:9-7:16



Have you had to stay indoors on a rainy day? Think about Noah with hundreds of

anxious animals and not a lot of room to play. On days when you have eager little hands waiting for something exciting to do, pull out a box of rainy day fun. Here are some ideas to get you started.

- Put together an indoor sandbox. In a box, put rice or dried beans with spoons and cups.
- Finger paint with yogurt or pudding and then eat your artwork!
- String popcorn to make a necklace. Create an indoor picnic.

On rainy days, you may have to make sunshine with your children. It's not hard to do when you remember together that God cares for us—in both the sunshine and the rain!



Abram Moves: Genesis 12:1-9



Children spend much more time at home than at the church

building. You are one of your child's most important teachers. Your willingness to invest time and effort in your child's life during these early, impressionable years will pay off as you see your child learn to respond to the world in ways that are pleasing to God.

Parenting is tough work. Remember to demonstrate throughout your day that you rely on God and follow His ways (Psalm 3:5, 6). Remember that little eyes are watching.



### Genesis 17:1

Find this verse in a family Bible. Highlight in the Bible what the Lord says about following Him. Say that part of the Bible verse together.

This week, help your child remember:

**Following the Leader.** Have the family form a line and take turns being the leader.

Abram and Lot: Genesis 13



Praise and encouragement are important to children. As children grow,

they need to hear frequent positive messages from others to gain a balanced and healthy self-worth and to know what is right and good about the choices they make.

Sometimes being a good encourager takes practice. Try saying these to your child: "I believe in you!" "You have shown effort and that is important." "You can try again." How refreshed we feel when someone comes alongside us and says a few positive words that motivate and encourage us in our choices. Commit yourself to doing the same for your child.



### Genesis 17:1

Find this verse in a family Bible. Toss a ball back and forth. Whoever catches the ball can recite what the verse says about God's power and obeying Him.

This week, help your child remember:

God wants us to make good choices.



Choices. Place two edible items under individual cups to hide them. One item should be something your child will view as a treat (a fruit snack or cookie). The second item should be something healthy, but perhaps not as exciting to eat (lettuce or bread). Place the cups in front of your child and have your child choose one. Show what is under the cup that wasn't chosen, and then show what is under the chosen cup. Talk about making choices. Pray and ask God to help your child make good choices.

Abraham and Sarah Have a Baby: Genesis 17, 18, 21

Joseph as a Boy: Genesis 37:1-28; 39:1, 2



As a child, were you afraid of the dark, certain animals, or shadows in the

closet? How did you respond to your fears?

You can help your children understand their fears and grow in their ability to overcome those fears. First, recognize a child's fears—no matter how silly or small they seem to you. Read books to your child with stories of kids who have experienced similar fears. Talk and pray about the fears.

The Bible talks about fear and reminds us that perfect love drives out fear (1 John 4:18). We must encourage children to be confident of God's love. He cares for us all the time.



### 1 Samuel 12:20

Find this verse in a family Bible. Create a rhyme that includes the words, "Serve the Lord with all your heart." Say the rhyme each time you leave your house.

This week, help your child remember:

God cares for us all the time.



Family Collage. On a piece of poster board, have family members draw pictures showing ways God cares for your family throughout the day. Talk about the pictures and then thank God for the ways He cares. Display the family masterpiece where it will be seen often to remind you how God cares for your family all the time.

#### **Oatmeal Muffins**

1 cup rolled oats, 1 cup milk, 1 cup flour, 1/3 cup sugar, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 beaten egg, 1/4 cup melted shortening

Mix oats and milk; let stand 15 minutes. Sift remaining dry ingredients into a bowl. Mix egg, shortening, and oatmeal mixture. Add to dry ingredients, stirring just to moisten. Spoon into muffin cups until cups are <sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> full. Bake at 425° for 20–25 minutes. Share the treats with a neighbor.

Samuel as a Boy: 1 Samuel 1–3

All people need other people in their lives who love and accept them no matter what. Our little ones are no exception. As caregivers, this is our first and foremost job!

Children in their earliest stages of life can experience God's unconditional love and acceptance through the people who care for them. Be sure to send messages of His love to your child every day.

Find this verse in a family Bible. Pull out a kitchen pan and a wooden spoon to tap a rhythm as you say the last sentence of the verse with your child.

Care Cards. Help your child name people who care for others: parents, grandparents, teachers, doctors, police officers, firefighters, and so on. Assist your child in making construction paper cards for two or three of the people on the list. Hand deliver the care cards and thank the people for the way they care for others. Thank God for these people and how He uses them to show His love.

Samuel Serves God All His Life: 1 Samuel 3, 8–10, 12



Finding ways your children can be helpers at home is a valuable teaching
